Holy Week and Easter - The journey of Jesus Christ to the Cross and the Tomb is a journey between fear and love. The chief priests and

Pharisees are afraid; afraid of Jesus, of Rome, of losing their power. In John's gospel, Jesus exhibits no fear, only love, and confidence in the love of God. In a recent devotion, I found a quote by author Gareth Higgins which I'd like to share with you:

> Look beneath your fear and you will discover what it is you really care about. What you wish to protect: people, places, things, hopes, dreams. Aggression, shame, and disconnection – even as attempts at making a better life for me or a better world for all of us – don't work. But as we expand our circle of

caring to include all people, all places, all creation, we discover that our fears are shared and that all our cares come from the same place. Come to understand your fear, and you may find that we're all just trying to figure out how to love.¹

God is love, and Jesus models the power of love for all people, places and creation, on the cross. This is central to our figuring out how to live and love in a fearful world.

- I am also grateful to Fred Biggers, Ron Myers, and Rew Walck for agreeing to take over the day to day management of the Property Committee. They started by hosting a Workday on Saturday, March 26th. A crew of eight members (including Brad!) made quick work of mulching and trimming, finished by a group of four on Monday, the 28th.
- Church Groups for a Service Day at Waynesboro Area Refuge Ministries (WARM) on March 21st! Grace youth helped sort socks, clear the yard, and learned a lot about how WARM helps the homeless in this area every day through the WARM House, and the Cold Weather Shelter, now run out of two hotels in this area. They also learned how Grace has been helping WARM for the last ten years!
- I am also thankful to our
 <u>Fellowship Committee</u>, and their
 work to care for the Tomey and
 Elliott families over the past
 couple of weeks for Dick Tomey,
 Ty and Elizabeth Elliott's funeral/
 memorial services. After two
 years of Covid, it is both

meaningful and joyful to share in fellowship in person, even as we give thanks to God for the lives of the Saints that have gone before us.

I am excited by a number of opportunities on the horizon at Grace:

- All God's Children our book study group will be offering a display table soon that will introduce us to a number of books and other resources to help tell stories, and inform us about we are All God's Children, and the opportunities we have to grow in God's Grace and fulfill Jesus' pray before his death on the cross that we be one in Christ, as Jesus and the Father are one (John 17)
- Christian Coalition for Equity and Justice – This group of Grace and Christ Tabernacle members hopes that the weakening of Covid gives us the opportunity to share in worship and fellowship events <u>SOON</u>. Look for more information in the coming weeks.

After many months in army facilities and places like the Massanutten church retreat center in Harrisonburg, these families will have a chance to have a place to live, find a job, learn about life in this area, and the places where their children will go to school.

Your Grace Council has created a Sabbatical Sub-Committee chaired by Grace President Robin Crowder that is organized and preparing for a smooth ten weeks from May 30th through August 15th in which worship and pastoral care will be available from the gifted talents of Pastors Karen Van Stee and Mark Radecke, while our Church Council and Committee leaders will step in to make sure that God's Mission for Grace, and the care we offer to one another, continues in a way that assures we continue to be a Community of Servants Sharing in the Word and Work of Jesus.

Highlights of Congregation Council March 15, 2022


- Financial Report review- Ron Almarode reported that GELC is \$1,947 behind so far this year. Expenses are \$4,180 under so far, but receipts are also under.
- Coronavirus report- The GELC Coronavirus committee met and have recommended that we follow CDC guidelines regarding masking policy. Our area is now in "yellow", meaning that new positive cases are at a moderate level, and have been steadily dropping over the past few weeks. The council voted to go to a "mask optional" status going forward.
- The Council voted to not hold the Easter Breakfast this year between the two Easter services.
- Council will be kicking off a Columbarium Debt Campaign in April working towards paying off building loan expenses related to the Columbarium. Selling ten (10) family niches will pay off the loan balance.
- Afghan Family Resettlement project-we are working with
 Westminster Presbyterian Church and St John's Catholic Church
 on providing housing and support for an Afghan Refuge family.
 Presently, 22 people have signed up from GELC. Committees will be
 forming up in the next few weeks to cover housing, transportation,
 food, etc.. to support a refuge family.
- Hiker Hostel- Irma and Woody Graf have volunteered to assist running the Hiker Hostel again this year. The Council voted to hold the HH this year, with the dates being tentative from sometime in May into June. GELC will be requiring proof of vaccination, with unvaccinated hikers being required to wearing a mask.
- The Property Committee reported that the Entrance structure on the Wayne Avenue side of the church entrance has been stabilized with cables for the short term. Braces will be added to strengthen the entrance structure and stabilize it for the future. A Grounds workday has been scheduled for Saturday, March 26^{th at 9am,} to get the church grounds ready for the coming growing season.

Welcome to Worship! A letter was sent by email and U.S. Mail

announcing a change to our masking policy at Grace:

- We will follow CDC "color" guidelines to determine masking at worship. If our area is in an Orange condition, we will mask for worship.

2022 Grant Process for Mission Endowment Fund

Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church has a Mission Endowment Fund whose purpose is "to fund mission work and projects at home and around the world that are above and beyond those programs supported through our regular offerings." Each year, the Mission Endowment Fund Committee and Congregation Council obtain recommendations from members of the Congregation as to desirable grants. It is time to start that process. Most important, the Fund is your Fund, and your participation in identifying desirable uses for the Fund's assets is essential. You are encouraged to complete a Grant Request form for consideration by Congregation Council.

The Grant Request form is an insert in the bulletin. Requests need to be submitted by Sunday, May 8. Congregation Council will review proposals at its meeting on Tuesday, May 17, to select the grants. In the past, this form, and the other documents referred to below, were available in the back of the church, so you could pick them up when you came for worship or stopped by during the week. We will continue to put the documents in the back of the church. But many of you are not coming to Grace for worship. So there are other ways to access the document. First, you can call or email the Church Office and they will mail or email the documents to you. The phone number is 540-949-6171 and email is Grace.lc@comcast.net. Second, you can stop by the Church Office and pick up the documents. Office hours are Monday-Thursday, 8:00 – 11:30 and 12:30 – 2:00. Third, you can go to the Church's website. A link to this document will be on the website. The address for the website is http://gracewaynesboro.weebly.com/. Hopefully, everyone can access the documents through one of these avenues.

Grants may be requested in any of seven (7) categories. Six (6) of the ministry categories are <u>designated categories</u>, which means that the funds for distribution in those categories must be used for the designated purpose. The seventh category – *The Grace Fund* - has its own Purpose, (see below), and it can also be used to supplement funding for a proposal relating to any other designated category. It is important to understand that over half of the available funds are from The Grace Fund. *Example:* A Grace member proposes \$2,000 to be used for Disaster Relief because a volcano eruption in Papua, New Guinea has threatened our Companion Synod there. \$594 of the \$2,000 would come from the Disaster Relief category. The remainder would come from The Grace Fund category in support of the proposal.

Here are the seven funds and the amounts that are available for grant from each fund:

- **Christian Education** (designated category) Purpose: "To provide education and training for lay and professional leaders in the congregation (seminar's workshop, etc.)." At least \$902 is available for distribution.
- **Seminary/Missionary Education** (designated category) Purpose: "Primarily intended to help with the tuition and expenses of seminary students from our congregation but may be applied to individuals in sister congregations in our area or the Virginia Synod or may also be used to help train missionaries for national or international mission." At least \$1,572 is available for distribution.
- **Social Ministry** (designated category) Purpose: "To provide support for those outside the congregation in need." At least \$1,008 is available for distribution.
- **Disaster Relief** (designated category) Purpose: "To provide support for mission trips and disaster relief efforts." At least \$594 is available for distribution.
- **Alleviating Hunger** (designated category) Purpose: "To be applied to local, national or international mission needs, including but not limited to: helping local indigent families, local Food Banks or the ELCA World Hunger programs." At least \$1,661 is available for distribution.
- **Special Music** (designated category) Purpose: "To provide support to the Music programs of the Church." At least \$6,505 is available for distribution.
- The Grace Fund (undesignated category) Purpose: "To support mission-oriented projects with grants from Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church to our local area, United States or World. Grants may be used to support local, national or global missions through existing organizations [(examples: WARM (local), the ELCA (national) or Global Mission (international)]. The Fund also may be used for startup mission programs within Grace. Grants may be given to support needs or programs for a one-year period or multi-year periods that can be extended up to three years to help support special projects or mission organizations that have been approved by Congregation Council. The Grace Fund may be used to support any designated category under the Mission Endowment Fund, whether currently existing or established in the future." \$18,516 is available for distribution.

What's most important is that the Fund is your Fund, and your participation in the grant request process is critical.
