From the Pastor

Pastor's Page

It may have been some time that you've considered the Bible, God's Word to us, as a

whole. It has an Old Testament, and a New Testament. It begins with Genesis, it concludes with Revelation. There are 66 books, letters, gospels, prophecies, etc. that make up the Bible.

We also know that we have a Church Year. It begins in Advent as we prepare anew for Jesus to come into our lives, not just in the manger. Christmas allows us to celebrate that God Is With Us. Epiphany shows how the Light of the World, Jesus Christ has come into the world. In Lent we follow Jesus as his life directs us to the Cross, where God's love for the world is lifted up for us and our neighbor. In Easter we celebrate that the deathliness of this world has lost its sting, because Jesus is alive, he is Risen! And he invites us to follow him as he prepares us to be the Church. Then comes Pentecost and the time after, where we remember that Jesus gave us the Holy Spirit to move and guide us to share the gospel with the world and in the "Galilee" in which the Risen Jesus meets us where we live.

In 2010, two scholars at Luther Seminary, one of the ELCA's seven seminaries, devised a new Narrative Lectionary – the readings we use each Sunday – which follow the Church Year just like we do now. The Narrative Lectionary is a little different. It begins in September, and starts with readings from the Old Testament, starting in Genesis, and moving through the stories of God in Creation, and God's relationship with the world and God's people. These stories reflect reality of the world that is both created very good, and because of sin and death, not yet what God has created it to be. By Advent, we will be hearing the prophets share their powerful words that point us to the way God will redeem the world through a promised Messiah. And then from Christmas to Easter, we will hear the gospel story from beginning to joyous conclusion. We hear from the book of Acts and the letters of Paul which show us how the Gospel begins to spread outward until Pentecost, when we celebrate God's promised Spirit. Then summer gives us an opportunity to focus on particular books from Old and New Testament (like Job, or Proverbs, or letters of Paul) to help us hear God's Word to us in the whole of a book or letter.

The Southern Valley Conference, a group of about 16 Virginia Synod Lutheran congregations in our area, has been looking at trying the Narrative Lectionary for a year. While the Revised Common Lectionary – the three year cycle of readings we are currently using allows us to hear the fullness of God's Word through four readings each Sunday, it often doesn't help us hear the full flow of God's Salvation story, particularly in the stories of the Old Testament (which was Jesus's Bible – and from which large parts of the New Testament regularly quote from!).

Grace Council, as well as our Round Tables, and Children and Youth Team, have been looking at the Narrative Lectionary since the beginning of the year, and will be making a decision about the use of the Narrative Lectionary in the next month or two. The format we have been using in You Tube worship since March 15th - having two lessons instead of four - will continue with the Narrative Lectionary. The primary Old Testament lessons of the Fall, and Sundays which focus on Paul's letters or Acts in Spring and Summer will also have a gospel reading. Sundays where the gospel readings are primary will have a Psalm reading to accompany it.

The contribution of our Lutheran heritage to the whole of the Church was to recover the central importance of God's Word – the hearing of it and the proclaiming of it – in our worship, and more importantly in our daily lives. God's Word will not come away empty, says the prophet Isaiah! And our becoming more fluent our God-given language of faith can only help us to negotiate the challenges and joys of this world in which we live, because it helps us to look for the God of Grace who has been with us all along.





Highlights of Congregation Council Meeting June 16, 2020

For the last three months, we have been worshipping on line because of the Coronavirus; and now as some restrictions are being lifted, we are looking for a safe way to resume worship and other activities. A survey was sent to all members of Grace seeking their thoughts on how to safely return to in-person worship. The Virginia Synod has recommended that Lutheran Churches not resume worship until Phase III.

We have had a Book Study Group for almost a year about race relations (White Fragility, Dear Church and How to be an Anti-Racist. The first two are national best sellers. Some of the members of the book study are going to be giving temple talks during our worship in July.

Grace's Antiracism Book Group began last fall, reading and discussing in succession three books on the role of white people in systemic racism and how to become an antiracist. The books were:

<u>White Fragility</u>, by Robin D'Angelo; <u>Dear Church: A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest</u> <u>Denomination in the US</u>, by Lenny Duncan; and <u>How to Be an Antiracist</u>, by Ibram X. Kendi.

We had no idea at the time as we finished each of these books and considered how to move forward with what we had learned that the whole country and much of the world would be plunged into painful and heartfelt consideration of how racism has affected our brothers and sisters of color and our role in the systemic racism in which we find ourselves. We believe the Holy Spirit had to have been leading us in our studies to bring us right to the point of realizing that we must be active in making changes in ourselves and in our community.

Racism is systemic and we, as white people, are all part of the system and benefit from it, often at the expense of non-white people. We need to emphasize that our benefitting from racism does not make us a bad person; but if we do not work to understand how inequality of opportunity has helped us, we cannot hope to work to eliminate inequities so that all people can be helped as we have been. We have found that being "not a racist" is not enough in the world today; we are called to adopt a new boldness so that our thoughts and actions work against racism – we must be <u>anti-racists</u>.

We believe it is important to share how this year of education and discussion has helped prepare us for the challenges our country faces today. We want to share what we have learned, but not from the standpoint of a finger point, or an assumption of "wrong-ness" in how we and our sisters and brothers in Christ at Grace would come to such a discussion; but around the discussion of "story" and asking seriously, "who is our neighbor?". The last year of study has shown how much we have changed, and how much we still have to learn from our neighbors of color.

We are God's people in Christ, and that WILL change the way we talk about this. We are not talking about this FIRST as friends, or whites, or family, or as "good people," or as Democrats or Republicans, or even as the Book Study group, we are talking about this as followers of Christ.

Why are we bringing this to you as our family in Christ? In order to follow the Scriptures that require us to love our neighbor. To increase understanding and resolve to correct injustices—to work together to become antiracists.

We will be offering temple talks, invitations to work together in small groups (either face to face or by Zoom) of Grace members and members of Christ Tabernacle, perhaps to read books and articles together, and to share tools that each of us might use to become antiracist.

Please contact any of us to ask about our readings and discussions and our planning for future work among the congregation and in the community to break down barriers and become one in our work together.
