# From the Pastor

**Pastor's Page Grace's 20/20** – The last two Round Table committee meetings, those in attendance have engaged in a series

of exercises: first, to look back twenty years – to the year 2000 – and to remember where we've been as Grace congregation, and as a community, Waynesboro and the surrounding area. Do you remember back to the year 2000? What was going on at Grace? What were some of the ministries and activities? How was Grace looking ahead at what God had in mind for Grace? What was going on in the community? What was happening in your life, and how did that intersect with your discipleship at Grace? Then, we looked at Grace as we are today, and asked what has changed? Where are we now, as a congregation, and as a community and world? What is God up to, and doing in and among us, by God's Spirit, at Grace? What can we celebrate? Where are we on God's journey for us? What needs to change?

Finally, we began to start to ask a third question; where do we envision Grace in 20 years from now, the year 2040? That's a harder question; we don't know what the world will be like, what Waynesboro and the surrounding area will be like. It's possible that in 20 years for a variety of reasons, we will no longer be here! I've recognized, thanks to my participation in ELCA Coaching (see below), that the question of what

Grace will look like in 2040 is not the best question to ask. However, what still remains is that it's important for us as the people of Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church to seek what lies ahead for us as Christ's Body here in this community.

ELCA Coaching - Assistant to the Bishop John Wertz asked nine pastors of the Virginia Synod, myself included, to take part in a new initiative for the Virginia Synod called ELCA Coaching. It's part of a larger goal within the Virginia Synod - and the ELCA - to promote vitality in congregations. I learned a lot in the two day training, which I attended Tuesday and Wednesday, September 24 and 25, and I will have some follow up meetings in October and November. One thing I learned and hope to learn more – is the importance of continuing to move forward: to determine where God is leading us to go, and more importantly, determining the steps to achieve those goals and commit to achieving them. And celebrating our progress! There have been countless surveys, studies and books that have concluded that vital congregations have a plan to move forward – and those congregations are working to determine what God's dream is for the congregation; what God has in

mind for us at Grace. We absolutely have a part in looking forward to Grace's future, and as Christ's brothers and sisters, and God's children, we know that it is not our hopes only, but our hopes rooted in God's promises and intentions for us, that will keep us vital and alive as Grace Ev. Lutheran Church. A look at our own history verifies that. Which is something to celebrate (as we did last year for our 125<sup>th</sup>)! And what will continue to move us forward with vitality in God's Mission for us.

Youth Proposal – Grace is combining with First Baptist, St. John Episcopal and Westminster Presbyterian to apply for a \$15,000 grant being offered by Young, Nicholas, Branner and Philips, a CPA firm in Harrisonburg that decided to offer the grant after seeing how many youth in the area are not active in church, and how many youth are not even familiar with Jesus, and God's gospel message of Grace. This is one way our downtown-area congregations and pastors have begun talking about pooling resources in ministry – to "row in the same direction" - not in competition, but in our unity in Christ and our sharing in the gospel. Pray for this and other ways we can share "in the word and work of Jesus!"

# Highlights of Congregation Council Meeting September 17, 2019

As the book study on "White Fragility" nears conclusion, the challenge will be to move forward from understanding to moving forward with how to address it as faithful people. Moving forward as One in Christ remains a great challenge for Christ's people but that is what God's Spirit is calling us TOWARD.

The Rise Against Hunger event, held on September 7, was a great success. We made 30,000 meals in an hour and a half with 177 volunteers from 16 congregations and 3 Waynesboro High School organizations. Many thanks to all our volunteers for being a blessing.

The Synod has asked Pastor to be a mentor to Adam Schultz, newly installed at Good Shepherd in Lexington. Pastor will meet with him regularly for two years in support of his first call.

Pastor will begin a coaching seminar Sept. 24-25 to receive training on "congregational vitality and renewal" which will benefit Pastor and Grace as we look back 20 years, think of today, and look ahead 20 years at what God has in mind for us.

Pledge cards will be mailed next week with commitment Sunday on October 6.

## Parking Lot, Pledges and Prayers



As many of you know, over the last several months, members of the church council, Pastor, and the Property Committee have been discussing the need to resurface, restripe, and increase the number of handicap parking needed for our members. Believe it or not, we do not think the parking lot has been resurfaced for 60+ years!!! How can that be? It is due mainly to the hard work of our members, over the years -

they have patched, tarred, prayed, and made some minor repairs. Their work has allowed us to make our parking lot serve this congregation for the life of our building. A typical parking lot is good for about 20 years and we have far exceeded that statistic.

Let's be honest – resurfacing a parking lot is not like renovating a pipe organ, or the chapel, or fellowship hall, something we see that enhances our worship experience and life together. It is not the most glamorous of projects, kind of like replacing windows or HVAC systems – we don't necessarily think about them or focus on them, but we know when we do not have them or they break. Being good stewards of our building and property has been important to the life of our congregation. A new parking lot will provide our members, visitors, and guests that use our building, a welcoming experience to Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church.

We anticipate the cost of this project to be approximately \$48,000+ dollars. As we begin our Stewardship AND Capital Campaign to expand our handicap parking, resurface the parking lot and driveway, provide some much needed landscaping, and restripe the parking lot, we need your help. The \$48,000 price may seem like a large number; and yet, even before we begin this Campaign, Grace Council has made an advance pledge of \$14,940, which already puts us <u>over 30%</u> toward our goal! We ask each of you to consider and make a pledge over a three-year period to support our Parking Lot Campaign.

You'll notice the title of this Year's campaign is Parking, Pledg<u>es</u>, and Prayer. We're combining the Parking Lot Campaign <u>with</u> our yearly Stewardship Campaign. You'll hear Temple Talks all through the month of September to help us remember that the Parking Lot is really only one part of our larger call: to be a *Community of Servants Sharing in the Word and Work of Jesus*. This also needs our pledge of resources and time. So, support the Parking Lot, yes! <u>As well as</u> our witness and ministry to the community and one another through the 2020 Budget for Grace. And PRAY to our Lord God, in thanksgiving for a generous heart (II Corinthians 8:10-12), who in Jesus Christ has so richly blessed us with one another, with the Grace property and building that is important to our life together, and for all the blessings God has given us to be a blessing to our community and world in our witness to God's Good News! That's this year's Parking Lot, Pledg<u>es</u>, and Prayer Campaign!

A gong sounded every 2,500 meals and 177 volunteers cheered until over 30,000 meals were made to send to people around the world in need. Sixteen area congregations took part! In addition to ten Virginia Synod Southern Valley Conference Lutheran congregations, there were Baptist, Church of God in Christ, Episcopal, Presbyterian, Roman Catholic and United Methodist congregations; along with the Key Club, the Beta Club and the National Honor Society of Waynesboro High School. This was truly God's Work, Our Hands in action ecumenically. Participants from ages 3 to 93 assembled meals of rice, soy protein, dehydrated vegetables and vitamin supplements; they were carefully weighed and prepared to meet a precise standard; sealed tightly for their

journey; and packaged them into larger container boxes in preparation for being sent to the place of greatest need. Rise Against Hunger is the organization that Grace Waynesboro collaborated with to set up the event and who will distribute the meals. It is possible the meals will go to the victims of Hurricane Dorian.

It is with the greatest appreciation that I send this letter to let you know that I received the generous donation to support the post-high program for students with exceptional needs. I believe I stated in my initial letter of request the new location for the program will be 344 S. Polar Street in Waynesboro. We are currently in the stage of expanding the main level to include a kitchen that the students can utilize for cooking activities, as well as, a laundry room, bedroom, and an additional restroom. The previous kitchen space is being renovated into a wheelchair accessible bathroom. I am hopeful that you have seen the article that was included in The News Virginian on 7/12/19, which notes the plans for the location, as well as, indicates the community partners that have made this possible.

We have been overjoyed with the support from the community and are so excited about the many opportunities that the changing of locations will bring. The move to a community-based setting will allow the students increased accessibility to work and volunteer sites, public transportation, and an environment that more realistically will prepare them for adulthood. The students from the program came out on United Way's Day of Caring in May to bring lunch for the volunteers, help plant shrubbery and put down mulch. The excitement about the new program and the fact that they could be productive contributors, just as we are working to ensure they are when they are adults, is truly what this program is all about. Thank you for your belief in this program, the young people and families who will benefit, and the adults who serve them.

If you have any available time, please feel free to drive by and see the changes that are taking place. Dr. Barber from Waynesboro City Schools, the program teachers and myself will be painting later this week. I will be happy to let you know exactly what the money contributed by Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church is spent on once it occurs. We will be having an open house when everything is finished and look forward to the council members coming to see what a difference your church has made in the community.
