From the Pastor

On August 19th, a group of about 10 Grace members attended the Southern Valley Conference, which Bishop Bob

Humphrey and Assistants to the Bishop Kelly Bayer Derrick and John Wertz were present. There was a time for questions and comments about the Church which allowed many people to give voice to concerns and joys in the Synod and its congregations.

It's obvious that there are great concerns, especially among smaller congregations in our area. But I was thankful and appreciative of the encouragement given by the Synod staff. Here are some important things I heard either directly or indirectly:

- Each congregation has a Mission– to share the gospel where they are – whether the congregation has
 10 in worship or 250 in worship. God has a Mission for us, to share the Good News of Jesus' Death and Resurrection, and sends us forth in service to the community we're a part of. The best stories are of congregations small and large who remain strong and vital because they KNOW what God's Mission for them is.
- We're living in a new time and place in the life of the Church. It can be a scary time and place when we see certain "numbers" and ways we have looked at a congregation's health decrease. However, we are also living in a

time where the patterns of people's lives are changing, and the Church has a call to understand what IS changing, and be open to try new things – and make mistakes, for the sake of God's Mission for each congregation.

As Lutheran Christians, we ٠ continue to have a unique Confession and contribution to the Church and to the World: we confess that God is gracious and merciful, and there is NEVER a time when we, or anyone else, has to earn that Grace. In a bottom-line world that is ever more quick to judge others worthy or unworthy, or not having done enough to earn their place in the world, or deserving of their place because of what they haven't done - our Lutheran confession is as important as ever.

John Wertz, the newest member of the staff, who specializes in Evangelism and Mission, will be leading a retreat with Grace Council and Round Table members on Saturday, September 29th. We have richly experienced *Blessings of Grace* – it's *God's Foundation for our Future*. God CONTINUES to guide The Church – AND GRACE – and is the Foundation – for our way forward; for Life that Really is Life. Pray for this Retreat and what God's Spirit does with it, and us!

Note from the above that God's Mission for us has to do with Sharing the Gospel, and Serving the Community. There are a lot of opportunities THROUGH Grace Lutheran Church to do just that - see the rest of this issue to find out how, and take part! However, I was reminded at the Virginia Synod Vocations Conference on August 17-18, (which I attended with Tyler Wertman, who is discerning his call to Ministry), that there is an important part of Sharing the Gospel and Serving the Community that we don't always emphasize as much: every time you and I Go in Peace and Serve the Lord, and leave Grace to be with our families, to go to work, to live in our neighborhood or community, to talk with friends, and to meet new people that God puts in our path, it's in those times and places that our call to share the Gospel and serve our community and world is most important, because it's in those moments when Christ's Body - vou and me - are most in the world. A world that NEEDS the gospel of God's love for the world through Jesus Christ. That's who we are! A Community of Servants Sharing in the Word and Work of Jesus. Wherever we are.

August 21, 2018

On August 19th and 20th, the Southern Valley Conference Gathering was held at Salem Lutheran Church. Continuing our 125th year celebration on August 26, our next guest speaker will be Pastor Joe Shumate, (son of Alfred Shumate and brother of Bob).

Mike Trauscht and Ron Almarode explained the annual budget process policy and how the budget is created. The program used in the past (Church Windows) had problems and we are now using Tithely.

Hodgkin's Lymphoma Catherine Raines, CHES

September is Blood Cancer/ Leukemia and Lymphoma 'Awareness Month. One cancer that falls under this category is Hodgkin's Lymphoma (HL). This is a cancer that starts in the white blood cells called lymphocytes, and the most common sites are in the neck, chest, and under the arms. The American Cancer Society estimated that there would be about 8,500 new cases of HL in 2018, and it is identified as one of the most curable forms of cancer.

There are two main types of HL which are Classic HL and Nodular Lymphocyte-Predominant HL. Classic HL is more common and accounts for more than 9 in 10 cases of HL. These cancer cells are called Reed-Sternberg cells, an abnormal type of B lymphocyte. There are four subtypes which fall under Classic HL: 1.) Nodular Sclerosis HL, 2.) Mixed Cellularity HL, 3.) Lymphocyte-rich HL, and 4.) Lymphocyte-depleted HL. Nodular Lymphocyte-Predominant HL is less common and only accounts for about 5 percent of cases. This type is characterized by

large cells called popcorn cells (because they look like popcorn) and grows more slowly. This type is also more common in men than women.

Although doctors and researchers do not know for sure what causes Hodgkin's Lymphoma, there are a few risk factors associated with the disease. People who have had the Epstein - Barr virus (often called mono) are at an increased risk of developing HL. However, the chance is still low (about 1 in 1,000), and researchers do not know exactly why this virus is associated with HL. Age and gender are also risk factors. Hodgkin's Lymphoma is more common in early adulthood (especially in a person's 20s) and later in adulthood after age 55. It occurs slightly more in males than in females. Those who have weakened immune systems already due to other causes are also at a higher risk of developing HL. Few of these risk factors can be changed, so it is not possible to prevent most cases of HL at this time. However, eating well, getting regular physical activity, and not smoking can contribute to your overall well-being and may lower your risk for developing many cancers and other diseases.

There are several signs and symptoms that are associated with Hodgkin's Lymphoma. Some who are diagnosed may have one symptom, several, or none Treatment depends on the exact type of HL and the staging. It could include chemotherapy, radiation, or a combination of both. If the HL is recurrent, immunotherapy or high-dose chemotherapy and stem cell transplant may be options.

After singing a hymn, or whatever else may serve your devotion, you are to go to your work joyfully.

The Evening Blessing

In the evening, when you go to bed, you are to make the sign of the holy cross and say:

Then, kneeling or standing, say the Apostles' Creed and the Lord's Prayer. If you wish, you may recite this little prayer as well:

I give thanks to you, heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ your dear Son, that you have graciously protected me today.
