<u>A REFLECTION ON</u> <u>MY SABBATICAL –</u> <u>Part I</u>

The guiding statement for the study portion of my sabbatical was to discover more about the role of relationship in racial equity and

justice. In some ways I anticipated the discoveries of this research would be a "no brainer," because in many ways we all know the importance of relationships. Relationships are about love, because love is at the heart of relationships. However, my sabbatical reading and study helped clarify what we mean by "love" in our relationships with each other as God's people, God's children.

Relationships are often about identity, because it is easier to connect with someone who shares our identity, whether that refers to being a Hokie or Cavalier fan; or a Waynesboro native, or a golfer, or a fellow DuPont retiree; a longtime member of Grace; or someone who shares our politics or perspective of the world around us. These are the smallest of samplings of identities that inform or guide our relationships.

Relationships are also often about memory, remembering. I reconnected with five friends in Atlanta, GA that I hadn't seen in probably 30-35 years. Any anxiety about reconnecting as I traveled through the city in July evaporated in a cascade of memory, enriched by "catching up," new stories and new experiences to add to things remembered.

I will be sharing with more with you and with others over the next few months: relationship is centrally important in racial equity and justice, through the love that God loves us through Jesus Christ; by our being a part of the purposes of God's Creation; and the invitation of the Holy Spirit to share ourselves (our time and our possessions) with others, which ultimately leads us to be the beloved Community God has created us to be.

Relationship is important in racial equity and justice, because we live every day with so many identities, which shape our relationships. Part of our daily walk of faith is to remember our primary identity as baptized children of God, which informs all of our other identities, and therefore guides and transforms our relationships with others.

And Relationship is important in racial equity and justice because we are people of faith, who are called to remember: do this in remembrance of me. (remember where we say that?) More times than we can count, God calls us to be people who remember. We remember who and whose we are, and in that memory, new stories and new experiences are added to and bring us into communion with others.

A brief recall of my sabbatical:

- We enjoyed meeting our daughter Lily in Berlin, after her Roanoke College immersion experience in May, spending the first 10 days of June in Berlin, "Lutherland," Leipzig and Wurzburg, Germany; and Prague in the Czech Republic.
- I had a memorable and powerful trip to Montgomery, and Selma, Alabama. I walked the Edmund Pettis Bridge in Selma, and had a great conversion with a young transplant to Selma from Chicago. I visited numerous historical sites and Civil Rights museums in Montgomery, and had a very enlightening conversation with Pastor Tiffany Chaney, a bi-vocational black Lutheran pastor while there.
- I made a stop in Atlanta, Georgia, catching up (as noted above) with five old friends.
- I had some great visits with Bishop C.D. Brown of Christ Tabernacle Church of God in Christ; the Rev. Dr. Leeman Bates in Charlottesville; Maurice Gallimore of the Virginia Synod Tapestry Committee, one of the leaders of the racial equity and

- justice team; and the Rev. Heidi David-Young, Tapestry Committee chairperson. All of them gave great insights and offered generous conversation.
- I had a wonderful retreat at Caroline Furnace, one of our Lutheran Retreat Centers in the Virginia Synod.
- We enjoyed a visit with Jill's family in South Carolina.
- I also enjoyed some rest and refreshment, some "putzing" around the house, working in the garden and with our fruit trees, including meeting with a retired Virginia Extension agent, who was more interested in discussing theology than fruit trees!

Thanks to each of you on Council for your leadership during these past 11 weeks; to Revs. Karen Van Stee and Mark Radecke, who by all accounts share their pastoral gifts and proclamation of the gospel richly during my absence.

Thanks to so many servants at Grace, who quietly continued their service to Grace and God's kingdom; and to Robin Crowder, Nancy Dowdy, and Mike Myers, whose oversight and attention to details made it possible for Grace to continue to be a Community of Servants Sharing in the Word and Work of Jesus. And that's who we are, together. Thank you for the opportunity to have this sabbatical, and may God's Spirit continue to guide us forward!



Highlights of Congregation Council August 16, 2022

- Pastor Pingel is back from his sabbatical! He will resume his normal office duties, including the weekly Friday phone calls. Ron did an admirable job with the weekly Friday phone calls in his absence.
- Pastor Pingel discussed the highlights of his Sabbatical. In the months ahead, Pastor will focus on the themes around relationships: love, identity, and memory. And relationships based on our relationship with God will end up with us being in community. Pastor expressed his gratitude for all those who stepped up to help out while he was away.
- Insurance: Ron gathered and reviewed insurance quotes to gauge the competitiveness of Grace's current coverage. The current insurance plan with Church Mutual was deemed competitive and will be renewed this year. Further investigation will determine the cost of increasing the amount for property replacement coverage given the steep increase in construction costs.
- Financial Report: Church finances look favorable with a surplus of \$11,423 year to date.
- Strategic Planning Committee: Five new priority planning teams will be assembled in August and September around key areas with the overarching goal to create and maintain a vibrant congregation. Each team will include members of the Council and congregation.

2022 Mission Endowment Fund Grants

Council received grant requests earlier this year and has approved grants totaling \$20,099. The total amount available for grants for 2022 is \$30,758, so we have \$10,659 remaining. The Mission Endowment Fund has seven ministry categories for which grants may be made. Three of the ministry categories still have funds available for grants.

All members of our congregation are encouraged to submit grant requests to the Congregation Council. You can submit your request by completing a Grant Request Form (available in the back of the church, on the website and from the Church Office) and placing it in the offering plate, giving it to a Council member or turning it into the Church Office. **Requests need to be submitted by Wednesday, September 14**. Council will review the requests later in September to select the additional grants. If you have any questions, please talk to Robin Crowder, President of Council, or any member of the Mission Endowment Fund Committee – David Schwiesow, Rudy Yobs, Gene McCombs or Bob Barrette.


Here are the three ministry categories and the amounts that remain available for grant:

- **Christian Education** (designated category) Purpose: "To provide education and training for lay and professional leaders in the congregation (seminars, workshops, etc.)." A 2022 grant for \$358 has already been approved. As a result, **\$544** is available for distribution.
- **Special Music** (designated category) Purpose: "To provide support to the Music programs of the Church." **\$6,505** is available for distribution.
- **The Grace Fund** (undesignated category) Purpose: "To support missionoriented projects with grants from Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church to our local area, United States or World. Grants may be used to support local, national or global missions through existing organizations [examples: Blue Ridge Area Food Bank (local), the ELCA (national) or Global Missions (international)]". The Fund also may be used for startup mission programs within Grace, Grants generally are given to support needs or programs for a one-year period. In special circumstances, grants may be given for multi-year periods that can be extended up to three years to help support special projects that have been approved by Congregation Council. For example, funds were needed over a two-year period to support the celebration of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation, so a two-year grant was approved. The Grace Fund also may be used to support any designated category under the Mission Endowment Fund, whether currently existing or established in the future. 2022 grants. 2022 grants totaling \$14,906 have already been approved. As a result, \$3,610 is available for distribution.

School began on the 9th and Masoka had all four of the school-aged children dressed and ready to go when our Welcome Team arrived at 6:45 a.m. to help them learn the way to the bus. Three of them are now in school at William Perry and Mapendo is in Headstart at Wayne Hills.

We're happy to report that everyone came home smiling at the end of the first day and they continue to do well! Their bus drivers brag on how good they are on the bus.

The littlest member of the family also hit a huge milestone this week. Happy had previously taken a step here and there but this week she began walking everywhere...all over the place... like she'd been doing it her whole life.

The team is also trying to get the 2 younger boys and Phiston into soccer leagues and we've found spaces for them. Transportation is our biggest need at this point. If you can help with driving them to practices and matches, please contact Ed Crawford. We need to have a transportation schedule in place before we actually register them so that we can ensure we have the resources needed for their participation.

Let's acknowledge that the M Family is Our Family now. They have been with us for more than 3 months and Church World Service plays less of a role after the 3 month mark.
