Welcome to Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church! There are four key parts to our Worship Service: we GATHER before our God to prepare to worship, and bring ourselves and all that we are before God. Then we hear the WORD of God; we share the four Bible Readings with at least one billion other Christians around the world each Sunday! And we hear that word proclaimed through the Sermon, confess our faith in the God whose Grace we hear about in the Word, and offer our prayers to God, for the sake of the Church, the World, and each other in our needs and joys. We then share in the MEAL of Holy Communion, offering ourselves and what we have to God, and then discovering God's love and forgiveness as we receive Christ's Body and Blood through the bread and wine. Finally we are SENT, the shortest but perhaps most important part of worship, because it is THEN that we live out our Faith and what we believe about God's Grace and Love, and how it makes <u>us</u> a blessing in this world as we share it.

During worship, you'll notice parts of the service in regular type, which are spoken/prayed by various worship leaders. Then there are parts the you and the rest of the congregation respond and/or pray in **bold type**. All of us are participants as we worship God!



Word

First Reading: Deuteronomy 26:1-11

A reading from Deuteronomy:

¹When you have come into the land that the LORD your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, 2you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the LORD your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the LORD your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. ³You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, "Today I declare to the LORD your God that I have come into the land that the LORD swore to our ancestors to give us." 4When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the LORD your God, 5you shall make this response before the LORD your God: "A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. 6When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labor on us, ⁷we cried to the LORD, the God of our ancestors; the LORD heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. 8The LORD brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; ⁹ and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. ¹⁰So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O LORD, have given me." You shall set it down before the LORD your God and bow down before the LORD your God. 11 Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the LORD your God has given to you and to your house.

A reading from Romans:







Thanksgiving at the Table

Reveal yourself to us in the breaking of the bread. Raise us up as the body of Christ for the world. Breathe new life into us. Send us forth, burning with justice, peace, and love.

Come Holy Spirit.

With your holy ones of all times and places, with the earth and all its creatures, with sun and moon and stars, we praise you, O God, blessed and Holy Trinity, now and forever.


The Holy Communion

The congregation may be seated.

OUR LORD BIDS YOU WELCOME TO THIS HOLY MEAL! At the table of our Lord Jesus Christ, God nourishes faith, forgives sin, and calls us to be witnesses to the Gospel. Here we receive Christ's body and blood and God's gifts of forgiveness of sin, life, and salvation to be received by faith for the strengthening of faith. In this sacrament the crucified and risen Christ is present, giving his true body and blood as food and drink. This real presence is a mystery. Admission to the Sacrament is by invitation of the Lord — regardless of Church denomination — to those who are baptized. (Taken from the ELCA statement on worship. The Use and Means of Grace ©1997)

Communion Distribution: One communion team will serve the left side of the nave; another team will serve those on the right. You are invited to come to the altar by the center aisle; take an empty individual glass (or filled grape juice glass) available at the railing, and proceed to the railing, filling in from the center out toward the side aisle. As you receive the bread and wine, you may respond as follows:

The body of Christ, given for you. The blood of Christ, shed for you. **Amen.**

Announcements

The Season of Lent

The following are ways Grace is invited into the discipline of Lent - ways to purposefully enter into a "exercising one's faith" to grow stronger in faith:

- Lenten Covenant: Make a commitment to give a tithe of the time you spend on your tablet, phone, computer, TV, or other electronic device to spend time in prayer, in reading God's Word, or a time of devotion. Example: If you're on Facebook or other social media, and/or watching TV, and/or surfing the web three hours per day (180 minutes), you'll commit to 18 minutes per day in prayer, scripture reading or devotions. This will be a sign-up where all who want to be a part will make a covenant to each other to engage in this Lenten commitment. Look in the March Newsletter and in early March on Grace's webpage for resources to help.
- <u>Wednesday Lenten Worship</u>: We'll share a Soup Supper and Evening Prayer worship with our neighboring Lutheran Churches, with each church hosting the Wednesday service each week beginning this Wednesday, March 13th, at St. James Lutheran Church. Our focus this year: Perfect Love Casts Out Fear. Soup Supper is at 6:00 p.m. with Worship at 7:00 p.m.
- Wednesday Lunch and Worship: A long standing tradition in Waynesboro has been for a number
 of downtown congregations to meet for lunch with a devotional worship service during the noon
 hour. We'll have an opportunity to take part this year, during the Wednesdays of Lent, beginning this
 week. Remember to sign up for lunch on the sheet in the Narthex.
- <u>Lenten Ecumenical Bible Studies Available:</u> Following our Ecumenical Classes during February, one proposal by the two classes for continuing to meet together united in Christ is to offer a *Lectio Divina* study group for the Sunday Readings during Lent. The study consists of reading the Bible Readings three times, and answering a simple question after each reading of how we hear the text, and what it says to us about our daily lives, and how God wants us to live. Starting this **Tuesday**, March 12th (11:00 a.m., at St. John Episcopal), and **Thursday** March 14th (7:00 p.m. at Grace), we'll look at the Readings for the following Sunday. The classes will continue through Tuesday and Thursday April 2 and 4.

Come quilt with us! The GELC quilting group will be hosting a Saturday quilting day in honor of National Quilting Day on Saturday, March 16 from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall. All congregation members and friends who would like to come join this merry band for the day are welcome – no real quilting skills required! There are opportunities for designing quilt tops, stitching them together, pinning tops to backs, cutting squares, and just joining in the fellowship! Quilts made by this group go to Lutheran World Relief, as well as to local needs such as WARM, our Christmas giving tree families, and local veterans in hospice care. Come for an hour or two or the whole time and plan to join us for lunch!

Altar Guild: Altar guild needs a volunteer to fill the side decorative candles with oil. This is only needed for the Christmas Eve service and during Holy Week. Grace Wedding Guidelines Forums - Look for a *letter this week* from Grace Council asking for your prayer and your input regarding Wedding Guidelines and Policy at Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church. Council is responding to requests from Grace members about our Wedding policy, in particular about same-gender weddings. This was mentioned at our Annual Congregation Meeting on Sunday, February 17th, and in Pastor's February 2019 Newsletter column. *Forums* have been scheduled for Weekday, Weeknight, and After-Worship meetings, so there is a time slot for everyone to be able to attend. The *Forum* dates are *Monday, March 18th (7pm), Monday, April 1st (11am), and Sunday, April 7th (after worship)*. Any reading of the Church in the New Testament points to times where the Church finds itself facing new decisions and times of disagreement in making those decisions. But with prayer and the participation of God's people the Church was able to continue forward as the Body of Christ in this world. Pray and take part in these forums!

Financial Statements for the year 2018 - Hopefully you have received your Grace Financial Statement for last year's donations. As has been announced in prior months, the year 2018 was a difficult year, as the software we were using became increasingly difficult to use, and resulted in a number of inaccuracies, through which much time was spent attempting to piece together correct statements. Many of you have still found inaccuracies, for which we apologize. Grace is slowly moving into the 21st century with new ways to communicate and we do know that it is not easy for some people. Consider this: to send Grace Notes to our member by snail mail costs about \$.75 each. We used to send out 150, well you do the math. It may get to people the next day but it may be two or more. 


