GELC Congregational Meeting

February 19, 2023

Ron Almarode called the meeting to order at 11:10 a.m.

Opening prayer was offered by Pastor Pingel.

Opening Liturgy given by Pastor Pingel and Ron Almarode.

Ron Almarode, who presided over the meeting, declared a quorum.

A motion was made by Jerry Kite to approve the minutes from the 2022 Annual Meeting, motion was seconded and vote was unanimous.

Ron Almarode presented the 2022 GELC Annual Report. He reported that GELC had a very successful year with several need initiatives. He referred to page 58 of the Annual Report and the total of \$77,647 in benevolence giving, a great example of our ministry programs at work.

Jerry Kite thanked Susan Myers for her leadership with the WARM Shelter in December and January at Grace with thanks also going to the volunteers. He also thanked the many volunteers for the Renewing Homes program this past year and thanks for the many volunteers in the Refugee Resettlement Program.

Donna Gum moved to approve the Annual Report as presented. It was seconded and approved with a unanimous vote.

Pastor Pingel closed the congregational meeting with prayer.

GELC Congregational Meeting

May 21, 2023

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Congregation Council Meeting Highlights January 17, 2023

- Pastor Pingel reported:
 - Good numerical news in terms of more members, financial news, etc.
 - Grace is involved in so many good things where Grace is representing Christ and being a blessing.
 - He will be going to Nicaragua along with five others from Grace on a mission trip to a children's school and home, February 11-18.
- Ron Almarode, Treasurer, reported that Grace finished in terms of pledge giving of record income, \$14,000 above budget, which speaks greatly to the congregation's response and to our inability to guess what that might be. Spending was \$3,600 above budget due to property expenses being up. These were necessary maintenance items.
- The Strategic Planning committee is currently working on communications and the need to look at ways we communicate within the organization.

Congregation Council Meeting Highlights February 21, 2023

- The Strategic Planning committee identified the key objectives to focus on, starting with the objective of full church engagement. The goal is to gather information and share it with the congregation to increase participation in the life of the church and the community.
- Grace is allowed three (3) representatives to the Virginia Synod Assembly this summer (June). Pastor Pingel, Donna Gum and Lily Pingel are planning to attend.
- Grace will be sharing Lenten Worship with Bethlehem, St. James and Zion focusing on the Apocrypha, a part of Holy Scripture in the Roman Catholic and Orthodox churches, but we know little of it in the Lutheran and other Protestant Churches.
- Owen Keefer requested \$3,200 for additional cameras to enhance the service recordings, which was approved by the Council.
- Outreach Mission reported a very active congregation in the church as well as the community.
- Grace has been notified that we may have an opportunity to be involved with the ordination of the new bishop. The date is Saturday, October 21, 2023.
- The church secretary has agreed to do the Council minutes for an additional \$100/month, not as part of her salary but an honorarium.

Congregation Council Meeting Highlights March 21, 2023

- The Treasurer reported that this financial report is somewhat below budget at this time, although it is not alarming at all.
- The Coronavirus Committee is staying on top of the issue.
- The Strategic Planning Committee reported that the first part of the committee's plan was to compile a list of Grace's ministries. Thanks went out to Karen Walck and Pastor for making that happen. The second part is taking a look at the future with the development of a comprehensive communication review of how we operate at the church and how we can make it better.
- President Crowder reported that this past week we received documents on how the money would be distributed from the Elliott estate and that the church is not responsible for taxes, etc. It was requested in the will that these monies be used for building maintenance.
- Pastor reported that five other congregations will be joining Grace on Palm Sunday outdoors for the Palm Sunday Reading. There will be two Maundy Thursday services, 10:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. with stripping of the altar, foot washing and holy communion. Good Friday's and Easter Vigil services will both be at 7:00 p.m. Easter Sunday services will be at 8:30 and 11:00 a.m. with an Easter Breakfast in between.
- Pastor reported that a prayer vigil had been held the previous Saturday with CCE&J. The group also went before the school board to support teachers and asked that Waynesboro not cave in to making history simpler rather than realistic, especially in terms of African American studies.
- The Hiker Hostel for this year is up in the air as we have received information from the City of Waynesboro's building inspector making lots of demands in order for us to host it.
- A request to repeat the mission trip to Nicaragua in 2024 has been received from the Radeckes. At this time, they are not asking for fiscal support, but asking Grace to support the trip and run funds through the Grace treasury, etc. as was done for the 2023 trip. Council approved this request.

Congregation Council Meeting Highlights April 25, 2023

- Council will present the Property Report from April 2023 to the congregation on May 21, 2023 for them to vote on approval of the requested expenditures utilizing the services of Austin and Sons, Baber Enterprises and Security Team LLC, for items 1-5 as listed in the report. Funding will come from Fo5 and F47 accounts in addition to borrowing funds from other accounts to be determined by the Finance Committee and further discussion will be held regarding repayment of those funds at a later date. Total expenditures recommended are \$75,250.
- Ron Almarode, Treasurer, addressed the payment plan for the Property Committee's recommendations. We do not budget for these types of projects; they are special funds expenditures. On page 3 of the Treasurer's Report, you will see two funds for this type of expenditure: Fo5 is the Building Fund and currently has \$2,000 in it and F47 which is the Capital Project fund and currently has \$17,000 in it. These two funds will not cover the projects but is the starting point for payment. In the past, for the organ and parking lot projects, we lent ourselves the money by making a resolution and paid ourselves back as the money came in. In both of these cases, we held a Capital Project Campaign asking the congregation to contribute and they responded beyond expectations. As we may have a good amount of money coming in later this year, there may be no reason to look at conducting a Capital Project campaign for these projects. Perhaps we should go ahead with these projects, lend ourselves the money and trust that these funds come in. On page 4, you will see funds at DuPont Community Credit Union in the amount of \$81,000. These funds are there because they don't move very much and gain interest, this is the fund we borrow from. The treasurer has a degree of confidence in going forward with these projects trusting that the funds will come in. If Council feels we really need to talk with the congregation and do a Capital Campaign, that is okay as well. However, there is concern about "going to the well" too many times
- Ron Almarode recommended to Council that a Building Fund Committee needs to be created to develop guidelines for the use of the funds that Grace hopes to receive from the Elliott estate in the amount of \$250,000.
- Ron reported that we finished March with an \$8,500 deficit. Looking back to 2022, we finished March with a \$10,000 deficit and finished the year with a healthy surplus. So, he feels there is no reason for concern at this time.
- Linda Meyer contacted Irma Graf and received and posted the present status of the Hiker Ministry in Grace Notes. It is currently on hold due to the City's guidelines.
- Stephen Van Stee reported that this past Sunday we had our first Sunday School class for K-5 and had three (3) youth and two (2) adults attend.
- Karen Walck reported that next Sunday will be the "Blessing of the Quilts". Over 50 quilts will be blessed to be sent to Lutheran World Relief.

Congregation Council Meeting Highlights May 16, 2023

- The Strategic Planning Committee continues working on improving communications, especially through the web-page. Their goal is to engage as many members as possible and to keep people updated with the latest information using any means we can.
- Grace's Refugee Family Resettlement celebrated their first anniversary with a nice gathering and taking the kids to the park and for ice cream. This family continues to thrive.
- Hiker Ministry 2023 This has been resolved with a "R5 Temporary Residency Permit" and a stairway built to the window.
- Approval of Grace Mission Endowment Fund proposals and distribution this year is \$28,418.
 - Blue Ridge Area Food Bank recommendation is \$500 from the Alleviating Hunger Fund
 - Legal Aid Justice Center recommendation is \$500 from the Grace
 Fund
 - Medical Assistance to Haiti recommendation is \$2,500 from the Grace Fund
 - Project Esperanza recommendation is \$2,000 from the Grace Fund
 - Augusta Health recommendation is \$1,500 from the Grace Fund
 - Raising Resources for Readers recommendation is \$1,500 from the Grace Fund
 - Embrace recommendation is \$500 from the Grace Fund
 - Addressing Critical Needs recommendation is \$432 from the Social Ministry Fund and \$3,568 from the Grace Fund for a total of \$4,000
 - Rise Against Hunger recommendation is \$1,035 from the Alleviating Hunger Fund, \$1,040 from the Grace Fund, \$548 from the Disaster Fund for a total of \$2,623
 - Boys and Girls Club recommendation is \$500 from the Social Ministry Fund
 - Society of Saint Andrew recommendation is \$500 from the Grace Fund
 - LifeWorks recommendation is \$500 from the Grace Fund
 - Madee Project Renewable Grant for \$3,000 approved by Council three (3) years ago – recommendation is \$3,000 from the Grace Fund
 - Hiker Hostel not funding because there are funds available through the Grace budget
- Grace will participate in the Waynesboro Ecumenical "Assistance Fund" for people in crisis. This program will address the increased needs in our area due to the Covid era supports for people in need ceasing. The result will be many people left in crisis. Grace will become a charter congregation of this 501c(3) that will be created to allow Waynesboro churches to donate to a

Congregation Council Meeting Highlights June 20, 2023

- Pastor Pingel reported that Dr. Phyllis Blair Milton was elected as the first African-American Female Bishop of the Virginia Synod with a three vote difference. She begins in September.
- Grace will be participating in the Rise Against Hunger Event on Saturday, September 9, 2023, at Kate Collins Middle School.
- 98 hikers attended the Hiker Ministry this year.
- The Council elected Robin Crowder as President and Allison Fink as Vice-President for 2023-24.

Congregation Council Meeting Highlights July 18, 2023

- Grace has had two (2) baptisms in less than a month and a half.
- David Schwiesow has agreed to take on the task of updating Grace's Constitution.
- A Building Fund Committee has been established to create the Building and Maintenance Guidelines for usage of the Elliott Estate Funds.
- Stephen Van Stee will be conducting Acolyte and Crucifer training.
- At the recommendation of the Covid Committee, Council voted to remove the tape from the pews.
- An additional Mission Endowment Fund grant request that was left off from the May meeting from the Radeckes for \$1,500 for CICRIN school in Nicaragua for supplies was approved by the Council and the \$1,500 will be taken out of the Grace Fund to fund this request.
- The Church Phone System has been replaced with analog phones. Using analog phones will greatly reduce the cost.
- Membership of Jackson Chaffin was approved by the Council.



Congregation Council Meeting Highlights August 15, 2023

- Ron Almarode gave a Treasurer's Update and an update on the church finances. He reported that July was a good month with a \$6,800 surplus for the month cutting our deficit in half.
- The Assistant Treasurer position has been vacated and Ron has taken over those responsibilities.
- Elliott Estate Update Ron Almarode reported that the money was received, funds were transferred out and \$250,000 is in Grace's account. The Building and Maintenance Fund Committee would like to set up a separate fund with a separate policy and procedures.
- Grace will participate in a Waynesboro Ecumenical "Assistance Fund" for people in crisis.
- The old Church phone system has been discontinued and we have two (2) new phones for the offices, which allow us to handle the two incoming lines.
- Stephen Van Stee reported that the curriculum has been ordered for Sunday School and is set to proceed with Sunday School on September 10.
- Pastor reported that we have three (3) confirmands starting on September 10: Libby Caister will be in her third year, Esme Hilker and Reva Franklin will be in their first year. Kiera Mahoney will be confirmed on Reformation Sunday this fall.
- Pastor also reported that we will be having three (3) youth (Libby Caister, Cabell Caister and Kiera Mahoney) going to the ELCA National Youth Gathering, which is meeting for the first time in six (6) years in 2024 in New Orleans.
- Robin Crowder reported that the church is preparing to start this year's Stewardship Campaign. Everything will be redone again so we are in need of pictures of church activities, pictures of the church, things that we can send them in order to create a brochure. We will develop, before the budget process, three (3) themes that are important to the church. This year, we are looking at continuing with our Ministry of Excellence, Communication, and Mission Outreach. We will be looking for another 10% increase this year.
- Donna Yobs reported that the idea would be for Grace to have an opportunity to go into members' homes and help check out safety issues. Stephen Van Stee recommended that we include general safety inspections of homes, i.e. smoke alarms, etc.

Congregation Council Meeting Highlights September 19, 2023

- 240 people and 19 congregations gathered together for the Rise Against Hunger Event and put together 30,000 meals.
- Bishop Brown from Christ Tabernacle and the Church of God in Christ and Pastor have talked and are planning a November Sunday before Thanksgiving joint service. This will be an opportunity for fellowship and worship together.
- Ron Almarode reported about a \$7,000 deficit.
- The Strategic Planning Committee is recommending that Council adopt the five (5) priorities and with a three (3) to five (5) year commitment from the Council.
 - Full Church Engagement
 - Good News Sharing
 - Senior Services
 - Growth in Outreach
 - Worship Opportunities
- Two (2) headsets have been received and will be used by the Eucharistic Ministers for homebound members who are hard of hearing.
- Linda Meyer reported that October 21 will be the Bishop's Installation Reception at Grace.
- Jerry Kite reported again what a wonderful event Rise Against Hunger was. They raised \$269 more than needed so they gave Kate Collins Middle School \$250 for the use of their facility.

Congregation Council Meeting Highlights October 17, 2023

- Ron Almarode gave an update stating that we are almost three-quarters through the year and are almost \$9,000 in the hole.
- The youth will be having a yard sale Saturday, November 4, to raise funds for the 2024 ELCA National Youth Gathering.
- Linda Meyer reported that the Christian Coalition for Equity and Justice is meeting first and third Thursdays each month, and the Prayer Vigils are held the third Saturday of the month.
- An announcement has been put in the bulletin and newsletter announcing a second wave of grants from the Mission Endowment Fund.

Congregation Council Meeting Highlights November 28, 2023

- There will be shared joint Advent services on Wednesdays with the other Lutheran Churches.
- Pastor Pingel was asked by Bishop Milton of the Virginia Synod to serve as the Dean of the Southern Valley Conference for 2024 and he accepted. President Crowder congratulated the Pastor.
- Ron Almarode reported that in October, we were \$3,200 to the good reducing our deficit for the year down to \$5,500.
- Ron Almarode presented the Building and Maintenance Fund Policy and Building and Maintenance Fund Procedures document. Council voted to adopt both.
- Robin Crowder reported the campaign is up and running with a good response. He reported that 109 pledge cards were sent out to congregation members. As of today, 36 pledge cards have been returned, including one new pledge, which means we have received approximately 33% of the cards back.
- Grace will be hosting the WARM Cold Weather Shelter in December.

Congregation Council Meeting Highlights December 19, 2023

- President Crowder reported that YTD, we have under-spent, but giving has also been below expectations leaving us approximately \$10,000 currently in the red for 2023.
- Per Council's vote, the Treasurer dipped into the reserves and paid off the mortgage on the Columbarium.
- Robin Crowder reported that we have made up about \$6,000 of the \$12,000 additional funds needed from individual gifts. The Finance Committee will meet in February to develop recommendations to meet the deficit.
- Sylvia Almarode, after 13 years, has decided to step down from leading the Fellowship Committee. She has done an amazing job.





Pastor's Annual Report

Grace's Annual Report gives voice to Who We Are, and What We Do. I invite you to take a bit of your time to look into these many reports which are provided for your information.

At first look, the Reports can provide Information about What We Do, or what we have done in the calendar year 2023. Grace is an active congregation, active in many things. I want to share a snapshot near the end of the year, when Grace was preparing to host the WARM Cold Weather Shelter in our Fellowship Hall. Near the end of the Worship service the Sunday prior to beginning our hosting, members and friends of Grace in worship were asked to stand and come forward. Fully 2/3 to 3/4 of those in worship came forward! It was a remarkable and moving sight. Here's another, very different example: every week, a quiet group of folks take Grace's altar flowers to Summit Square, where they are used in Sunday afternoon worship at Vespers, turned into birthday or "get well" bouquets for residents, or provide a bit of color in the entry area.

We are an active congregation in our Community, blessed to be a blessing. Seriously, take a look at the reports within this Annual Report. There's a lot happening in and through Grace.

What I hope for 2024 is to continue to get better at giving witness to WHY we do what we do. It is our Evangelism, or witness to the Gospel. In many ways we practice what St. Francis of Assisi has been credited as saying: "Preach the gospel, always. If necessary, use words." Lutheran Christians are often shy at "using words." At the same time, it is ironic that our Lutheran Christian tradition focuses as much or perhaps more than any other tradition in the *importance* of the Word in our lives. Jesus, the Word, who came among us full of grace and truth (John 1:14). The Word of God found in the gospel, which provides the Good News that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us as a demonstration of God's love (Romans 5:8); that nothing can separate us from that love (Romans 8:39); that we are God's handiwork, and the good that we do is because God both saves us, and makes us - creates us - to join God in what God is doing in the world. (Ephesians 2:8-10, the Message).

Pastor's Annual Report Continued

A number of years ago, I served a congregation where one of its leaders described a proposal to use the Congregation's Parish Building to serve meals to the homeless. I'm convinced that he had the best intentions in mind when he said, "when you come down to it, it's the right thing to do." And yet, at the same time, that's not our primary reason for What We Do. Instead, it's a part of our calling as followers of Christ to be salt and light in this world! Whether taking part in Grace's ministries or whether we are active in our Community in other ways, what I am *giving witness* to [Evangelism!] is that Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church gives witness to Jesus in all that we say and do. That's Jesus' Great Commission for us. To go, therefore, and make disciples, baptize, and teach. (Matthew 28:19-20). We do that by naming the Name in what we say and do.

The mainline Church has become shy in Naming the Name. It could be because we are gun-shy of other Christian traditions which have used the name of Jesus as a blunt instrument to threaten or warn others of God's condemnation, and provide conditions for God's love and grace. And yet that's not who we are, nor is it the work of the Gospel! Grace has the word Evangelical in its name. Some have suggested leaving that name behind, because in our day and age "Evangelical" has developed its own reputation. Yet that word is a much greater value than the narrow definition provided today, which is associated with ideology, political leanings, and even race. **The gospel** tranforms rather than divides us. And that's what we're called to do! In What We Do, and What We Say: take part in God's transformation of the world through Jesus Christ.

I'm thankful for our "What-We-Do" Evangelism in the Community in 2023. One more story from that year: we have met many times with Christ Tabernacle in advocating for Equity and Justice. One blessing of that work is their *witness* to Jesus in all that they say and do. Their prayers are full of "The Name of Jesus." At a Christ Tabernacle Christmas concert, after a beautiful solo piece, the Minister who hosted the concert gave thanks for the singer *briefly*, then showered thanks and praise to our Lord Jesus for giving gifts and talents to all of us, and letting us use what God has given us for both praise, witness and service to the world in the Name of Jesus. That's my prayer for Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church in 2024; to give voice in the name of Jesus through What We Do, and by saying Who We Are: *A Community of Saints Sharing in the Word and Work of Jesus*.

Our hope and blessings seem to be enhanced by our mission and love for one another, while our ability to be agile and receptive has proven to open our doors to new and exciting opportunities.

We continue to appreciate the importance of technology and Owen Keefer's weekly talents of sharing our Sunday worship with those who are homebound or not able to return to church. He also shares his gifts with the congregation for Annual Meetings, funerals, and other celebrations. Owens dedication and unassuming nature should not be underestimated. We have learned we can participate in the life of Grace from home, the beach, or during illness, through the commitment and gifts of Owen Keefer.

Nancy Dowdy and her fleet of volunteers have ensured the important administrative work of the church is done with little fanfare. Her bookkeeping expertise, office organization, and creative insights continue to provide our members with the weekly organization needed. Nancy, along with the expertise of Carolyn Hite, have ensured the office is open and ready for business and assists our members when needed.

The expertise of Fred Biggers, Rew Walck, and Ron Myers have served as a powerful Maintenance Team. They have stepped up and provide great leadership to the unending needs of an aging building. A new roof, several engineering projects, increase in hot water availability, and an eye for detail has brought new life to our facilities. We are thankful for their dedication.

Gwyn and Jerry Kite, along with a strong cohort of volunteers from Grace continue to lead our Outreach Mission work. Their ability to provide leadership to multiple projects makes a difference for our community and members of our church. Whether building a ramp, packing meals for children at William Perry and Wenonah Elementary, working with our local homeless populations, serving breakfast and lunch in our community, providing 30,000 meals for Rise Against Hunger, Gwyn and Jerry's leadership, along with the grace of God, continues to identify opportunities for our church members to share God's love throughout the community and the world.

This year's Stewardship Campaign was met with some difficult decisions. But because of your love for Grace, the whole church, our community, and your

commitment to sharing, the Good News will continue. This year's theme "Embracing Grace - Generous, Loving, and Caring 2.0" certainly represented the members and friends of Grace. While not fully meeting our budget projections, we are able to support our staff, caring for our building, and ensure our outreach. While we were able to have a single campaign and provide benevolence to the larger church, we did have to reduce the amount to several of our budget items. It has been necessary to have a "Faith" deficit in our budget for the upcoming year of almost \$5,000. Special thanks to Ron Almarode and the Finance Committee, along with the invaluable counsel of Pastor Paul for their leadership in this year's campaign.

Our Mission Endowment Fund Committee, under the leadership of David Schwiesow, has provided funding to multiple groups throughout our community. A new and exciting Maintenance Fund has become available through a generous gift from the Elliot family.

Bob Barrette, along with several members of Grace, have worked hard to develop a new and dynamic Strategic Plan for our church. "What has God called Grace to do?" Bob and his team engaged our members, asked difficult questions, and prayerfully explored our mission and direction for the future. Our Church Council will now work with the congregation to plan and meet the objectives and goals of this work. We are hopeful the Holy Spirit will help each of us identify how to make this Strategic Plan work.

We continue to work with our partners at Christ Tabernacle Church of God to create conversation and understanding with diverse groups. The Christian Coalition for Equity and Justice continues to meet on a regular basis for book study, prayer vigils, and pulpit sharing. We celebrated with Christ Tabernacle as they moved into their new space on Delphine Avenue and how they will better serve our community.

Another year engagement with the Congolese family has been exciting and rich with opportunity to share God's love. Many of our members share their gifts of time, resources, transportation, tutoring and so much more with our refugee family's transition into a new and different world. Grace, along with Westminster Presbyterian Church, have embraced this family as they adjust to a new and exciting life.

Our church building continues to be a hub for our community by providing space for the Valley Music Academy, the Newcomers Club of Waynesboro, a local Bridge Club, Saturday morning and Wednesday Yoga classes, the Grace Quilters, the Hiker Hostel, the WARM shelter and many others.

The Pastor continues to offer "New Member" classes to those interested in joining Grace, providing several Bible Study groups throughout the year, and Catechism to our teens.

Our hope is Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church can show and provide you with many opportunities to serve in the Word and Work of Jesus Christ. You, along with so many, certainly represent the Body of Christ at Grace. There are way too many unsung heroes that show up day in and day out to do the work of the church. A few that come to mind are Donna Gum who works tirelessly to ensure Assisting Ministers are in place each week and serves as the Chairman of Music and Worship. Christian Education/Youth

ELCA National Youth Gathering

In July 2023, youth of Grace began planning for a faith formation experience. In conjunction with Youth of Salem Evangelical Lutheran Church in Staunton, three Grace youth, Cabell Caister (17), Libby Caister (14), and Kiera Mahoney (15), and adult advisor Jessi Blosser decided to attend the National ELCA Gathering in New Orleans July 15 to 20, 2024. The Gathering will be comprised of 30,000 youth across the country coming together to celebrate, learn, be uplifted and serve. To experience The Gathering, youth hope to raise \$6,000 to cover the expenses of three youth and one adult advisor. On December 3rd, they sold "Stock Certificates" for the trip, and December 17 they offered Christmas Wrapping in exchange for donations to the trip. So far, the youth have raised over \$2,300 dollars toward their \$6,000 goal. In 2024, Grace youth will continue to sell stock opportunities, and you won't want to miss a chance to invest - I hear the returns are unparalleled. :-) - the Youth also plan to host a Spaghetti Dinner, and more.

It was a joy to see these sisters in Christ grow in faith and move toward affirming their Baptism into Christ's death and resurrection.

Worship and Music Report

The assigned Stewards, for that week, meet at the Church on the agreed upon day, to ensure that the offering has been tabulated correctly. The Stewards make sure the checks are correctly filled out, ensuring that the checks are signed, the date is correct, and the amount is correct at both places on the

check. Checks that have errors are returned the Church Secretary, until the errors are corrected by the Church member. A deposit slip is then filled out and the offering is taken to the bank and deposited, by the assigned Stewards. The bank receipt is taken back to the Church and given to the Treasurer. At certain tines in the Church year, Christmas and Lent/Easter, additional offerings are collected. The procedures remain the same.

Evangelism and Hospitality

All God's Children

This group has been active since November, 2019 when we began discussion of our first book, *White Fragility*. In 2023, the group met twice monthly in person and via Zoom to discuss racial equity, justice, truth telling and transformation through books, videos and current events.

Children

We started the year discussing two works by Clint Smith, a black American writer, poet, and scholar. The first was an article from *The Atlantic* entitled: "Monuments to the Unthinkable – America still can't figure out how to memorialize the sins of our history. What can we learn from Germany". The second was his award-winning book, *How the Word is Passed: A Reckoning with the History of Slavery Across America*.

We then considered *Jesus and the Disinherited* written by the Black minister, theologian and civil rights lead, Howard Thurman, in 1949. Famously known as the text that Martin Luther King Jr. sought inspiration from in the days leading up to the Montgomery bus boycott, the book helped shape the civil rights movement and changed our nation's history forever.

The group also read Tony Morrison's only short story, *Recitatif*. The story concerns two girls, one Black and the other White. However, the author never reveals which one is Black and which one is White. The story stimulated much discussion.

Next we considered *Barracoon: The Story of the Last "Black Cargo"* by Zora Neale Hurston. In 1927 and 1931, Zora Neale Hurston went to Plateau, Alabama, to interview 86-year-old Cudjo Lewis. Based on those interviews, Zora Neal Hurston illuminated the tragedy of slavery and of one life forever defined by it.

We concluded the year's readings with *US*: *The Resurrection of American Terror* by Kenneth W Wheeler a Black ELCA pastor who took us through his seven-decade-long journey that lays bare the terror of being Black in America. The book offers a deeply vulnerable and piercing portrait of the human toll of white supremacy and points to the Cross as a place of hope and reconciliation.

In addition to these readings we discussed Bryan Stevenson's Scoper Lecture presentation at UVA in March. We also watched together the Richmond Forum session *The Absolute Condemnation of No One* featuring Dr. Cornell West and Thomas Chatterton Williams.

In April, the group sponsored Lily Pingel's presentation of her Roanoke College Senior Thesis: *A look at the Virginia Synod of the ELCA: One of the Whitest Christian Denominations in the United States.*

Finally, All God's Children worked with the Christian Coalition for Equity and Justice (CCE&J) and the congregations of Grace and Christ Tabernacle Church of God in Christ to raise money to support Project Esperanza. Contributions totaled \$7,475, enough to sponsor twelve students for a year. The mission of Project Esperanza is to form a global community focused on creating positive change and a sustainable future for Haitian refugee and immigrant youths in the Dominican Republic through education and empowerment.

Christian Coalition for Equity & Justice (CCE&J)

Grace-Christ Tabernacle Discussion, Fellowship, Advocacy and Service Group

2023 marked the fourth year for CCE&J as members from Grace and Christ Tabernacle Church of God in Christ resumed meeting in person (with a Zoom option) led by Bishop C.D. Brown and Pastor Pingel. We continued our journey of "falling in love" with each other and building on the goal of becoming a resource and example for our community. Activities for 2023 included:

Fellowship & Spiritual Engagement

- Our monthly Prayer Vigil to pray for racial justice continued on the third Saturday of every month at 11:00 a.m. in Constitution Park (even months) and North Park (odd months).
- The shameful intersection of racism and anti-Semitism represented by the defacement of the mural at the Waynesboro YMCA inspired us to call for a community response. We held our January Prayer Vigil in front of the restored mural at the YMCA on Saturday, January 21. On this Martin Luther King Jr. weekend, over 150 members of the community who had an interest in seeking God's help to guide us to racial, religious, and ethnic reconciliation, equity and justice joined us as we peacefully prayed together.
- In December, the Prayer Vigil was held at Constitution Park and was followed by a wonderful lunch and gift exchange at Grace.
- Our first dinner for eight was held in February at the Putnam's home. A wonderful time was had by all as we shared personal stories and reminiscences and enjoyed wonderful food.
- We noted the end of Black History Month by recalling several examples of under-publicized Black contributions to American history.

- Maurice Gallimore, the Director of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion at Encircle (formerly Lutheran Family Services of Virginia) attended a meeting in March as a guest of Pastor Pingel. Maurice shared a thoughtful summary of his assessment of current DEI issues and of his vision for future progress in these areas.
- The Palm Sunday processional united multiple Waynesboro churches, including Grace and Christ Tabernacle.
- On November 19th we shared a memorable and inspiring combined Thanksgiving service and potluck lunch at Grace. The event was well attended by members of both congregations who socialized together after the service.
- Throughout the year, members shared challenges and frustrations they encountered in the real world and in working situations. These were often powerful confirmations of the persistence of racism in our communities.

Community Service

- CCE&J worked with All God's Children and the congregations of Grace and Christ Tabernacle Church of God in Christ to raise money to support Project Esperanza. Contributions totaled \$7,475, enough to sponsor twelve students for a year. The mission of Project Esperanza is to form a global community focused on creating positive change and a sustainable future for Haitian refugee and immigrant youths in the Dominican Republic through education and empowerment.
- We agreed to offer to provide work crews for service to Renewing Homes of Greater Augusta. Group members helped install a temporary wheelchair ramp at a home in Stuarts Draft in September.
- Grace and Christ Tabernacle CCE&J members worked side by side in the Rise Against Hunger event in September at Kate Collins Middle School.
- We agreed to support HERO (Housing Emergency Relief Organization) of Waynesboro. HERO's mission is to provide emergency financial assistance to residents who are facing eviction or utility cutoff.
- We committed to provide sack lunches at the WARM Shelter at the Augusta Expo Center in early 2024.

Community Engagement

• The group has sent representatives to both the Waynesboro School Board and City Council meetings to help keep the group informed and to be a visible presence in the community.

Continued



- In March, CCE&J presented an oral and written statement during the Waynesboro School Board meeting in response to recent political attacks on the history curriculum in Virginia. Presented by Taunya MacDonald and Linda Myer and supported by many other Black and white CCE&J members who stood in solidarity, we stated that "CCE&J is proud to stand in support of teachers, administrators, board members, parents and, most of all, students, who expect and deserve comprehensive truth and accuracy in history education." The message was well received as evidenced by post-meeting comments from a School Board staff member, teachers from the Waynesboro Education Association, the Assistant Superintendent, and a School Board member. The transcript of the presentation was published as a letter to the editor in the News Virginian on March 30.
- We celebrated together the successful transfer of the Basic Church property to the Christ Tabernacle Church of God in Christ. Bishop Brown summarized the challenges and disappointments of the ordeal leading to the transfer, but also noted the opportunity to extend Christ Tabernacle's outreach to those in need in the neighborhoods around the church.

• Bishop delivered a prayer at the Staunton NAACP meeting in May. His prayer expressed thanksgiving and supplication for the ability to survive the evils of white supremacy and racism.

Faith in Action/Stewardship Embracing Grace - Generous, Loving, and Caring 2023 Year End Update

Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church continues to be a beacon of hope in our community. Your generous time, talent, and financial gifts allow us to reach inside and outside the church to share the Good News of Jesus Christ.

The 2023 Budget was developed based on the 2022 Stewardship Campaign. The 2022 theme, "*Embracing Grace - Generous, Loving, and Caring*" was a great success and we were able to move forward with the recommended budget from the Finance Committee for 2023.

In November and December of 2023, usually very good months for gifts to the church, proved not to be the case this year. For the first time in 10+ years the November and December financial gifts did not meet the expectations. The loss of income created a \$20,000 loss to the budget. The Church Council voted to reach into the Master Reserve Account to meet the 2023 budget. This was a major disbursement from our reserves.

As each of us reflects on the past year, please consider a one time gift towards the 2023 budget to rebuild the Master Reserve Account. The impact of your additional gifts will help us ensure a strong financial balance as we move into 2024.

The needs for our congregation and community are many, but with God's mission at the forefront we can continue to "Embrace Grace - through our generosity, deep love for Christ, and a caring heart for those in need".

Mission Endowment Fund

Committee Membership

The members of the Mission Endowment Fund Committee are David Schwiesow, Chair; Jerry Kite, Recording Secretary; and Glen Gray. Pastor Pingel and the President of Congregation Council also are ex officio members of the Committee. The Committee wishes to acknowledge, with its thanks, the service of Bob Barrette, who served on the Committee for several years during and prior to 2023. Any member of the Congregation who would like to volunteer to join the Committee is encouraged to speak to David or any other member of the Committee.

Investment Performance

The assets in the Mission Endowment Fund are invested (i) in Certificates of Deposit (CDs) through the Mission Investment Fund of ELCA and (ii), with respect to all other funds, in equities and interest-bearing instruments selected by Alpha Omega Investment Advisors ("Alpha Omega"). Alpha Omega are professional investment advisors that were selected by the Committee and approved by Congregation Council in 2018. The specifics of the investments and the market values of these investments as of December 31, 2023 are:

- Through the Mission Investment Fund of ELCA, one CD is held, having a value of \$146,711. The maturity date is May 7, 2025. The interest rate is adjustable, and currently is 4.048%.
- The Alpha Omega investments had a year-end value of \$512,170. The investments consisted of equities (\$366,296), bonds (\$90,312) and cash and cash equivalents (\$55,562). At year-end 2022, the total value of the Mission Endowment Fund that was managed by Alpha Omega was \$491,321. The market value increase during 2023 was \$30,725. Interest and dividend income was \$18,615. In addition, there were \$29,086 in actual and accrued grant distributions.
- At year end, the Mission Endowment Fund also received a contribution of \$5,000, for which it expresses its appreciation.
- At year end, there also were four grants that were approved by Congregation Council on December 21, 2023. The funds for these grants, totaling \$7,463, will be distributed in 2024.
- The total value of all Fund investments at December 31, 2023, after adjusting for the \$5,000 contribution and the \$7,463 in undisbursed grants, was \$656,418, as compared to a total value as of January 1, 2023 of \$625,654.
- Total grants that were distributed from the Fund or committed for distribution in 2023 were \$29,086.

With respect to the performance of investments that were managed by Alpha Omega, these investments showed a positive return for 2023 (interest, dividends and market performance) of \$49,340, or 10.04%. The Committee continues to have confidence in Alpha Omega and its investment approach.

Available Funds for Grants in 2024

Each year, the Committee recommends, for Congregation Council's approval, that the funds available for distribution in the current year (i.e., 2024) will be a percentage of the fair market value of the Fund (including realized and unrealized income and gains) as of the prior year end (i.e., December 31, 2023). In the past, the percentage available for distribution generally has been in the 4-5% range. At its meeting held January 16, 2024, Congregation Council approved the Committee's recommendation that the making a contribution to the Fund, regardless of size. Contributions may be made currently or through a bequest in your will. If you would like to get more information about how you can make a difference, please speak to David or any other member of the Committee.

Area Food Pantry

Thanks to those who have donated peanut butter, mac 'n cheese, personal hygiene items, dried rice, beans and other items at Grace which we have delivered to Main Street UMC and Calvary UMC food pantries during 2023. We will continue to have our donation box inside the office door for food collection in 2024.

Back to School Supplies

For the 2023-24 school year, over 25 Homework Toolboxes were donated to the Salvation Army for kindergarten and first grade students in Waynesboro and Augusta County. These boxes are given to students to ensure that they have the supplies at home that they need to complete assignments. Grace has participated in this program for more than four (4) years.

Backpacks

Grace continues to support the Waynesboro Public School Back Program with food being packed weekly during the school year. Grace members have developed two packing teams and we have partnered with St. John's Catholic Church with each church packing every other week to support Waynesboro School's program to provide food over the weekend for children in need. This year we are packing for



William Perry ElementarySchool, Berkley Glenn and Wenonah Elementary School children. We are packing approximately 178 bags a week for the three schools.

Community Pot Lucks

The Community Meal began weekly gatherings on September 13th, 2023 and concluded for the season on December 13th, 2023 (I believe). The idea for a community meal came from a book group where members of Grace read and discussed Christine Pohl's work, *Making Room: Recovering Hospitality as a Christian Tradition*. The meal intended to fulfill two primary functions: to provide a meal for folks in need on Wednesdays (when there is currently no other meal offered in Waynesboro), and to welcome folks from the community into relationships of hospitality. Eating together is one of those practices with important potential for both strengthening our own community and welcoming those from outside, so rather than a soup kitchen model (where 'we' serve 'them'), we opted for a pot luck model, where all are invited to join and eat together, whether able to bring a dish to share or not.

The Community Meals developed over the course of the three months we were running. In the first weeks, there were many people from the book group and several others from Grace who came, brought food, ate with guests, and helped to clean up. We had around 40 people total in the early weeks (I never remembered to count, not even once), and about half were from Grace and half from the broader community. People found out about the meal primarily from flyers at Disciples Kitchen and The Prayer Room (Frankie's place), and from Kirk Hyden who helped get the word out. My sense was that guests really appreciated being invited in to join a meal, rather than simply being served. Many guests began bringing food and helping with set-up and clean-up. The number of Grace members declined over the course of the three months, and by the end we were left with only a few consistent Grace members (many thanks for their work!). The number of guests dropped after WARM opened, our last gathering had 20-25 people.

The model of the Community Meals seems to me to be working very well. The way that folks (many that receive meals regularly at area soup kitchens) took on the task of bringing food for the meals was an encouraging sign that a community had formed, where they felt less like guests and more like members. I also believe that relationships between Grace members were strengthened, and folks from Grace welcomed in people who are often left outside of communities (even when being fed).

Folks from the community were sad to hear we would be putting the meals on hiatus until spring. There were a few reasons to take a break: the reduction of guests once WARM began; the reduction in Grace members meant fewer members were more regularly carrying the load; the Advent and Lent seasons meant Wednesday evening activities at Grace and other area Lutheran churches. My hope is to begin the meals again when WARM concludes the cold weather shelter season. The challenge I foresee will be to retain a consistent group of Grace members

will be to retain a consistent group of Grace members willing to engage with the meals throughout the summer, without relying too heavily on a few devoted members.

Addressing Period Poverty in Ghana




Who is affected? *Period poverty* affects at least 20% of girls and women in Ghana, especially in the rural areas.

What is it? As a worldwide problem, period poverty is defined as the lack of access to safe and hygienic menstrual products, sanitary services or facilities (clean toilets, water, and privacy), waste management, and basic education.

The use of unsafe products, i.e. newspapers, rags, cement bags, dried cow dung, sawdust, cardboard, chicken feathers, dried plant leaves, or limited disposable products, leads to embarrassing situations as well as bacterial infections, UTI, and reproductive issues. Shame about ignorance of menstruation and hygienic products, uneducated traditions, and stigma keep women from seeking necessary help.

Why is it a problem? *Period poverty* often prevents females from reaching their full potential because they miss out on opportunities for education and growth. Young girls who do not receive an education are more likely to experience early pregnancy, malnourishment, domestic violence, and pregnancy complications.

Share of minimum wage it takes to buy two packets of cheaper sanitary pads




Meeting the hygiene needs of impoverished adolescent girls is a fundamental issue of human rights, dignity, and public health.

Addressing the Period Poverty issue in Ghana: The purchase of many of the least expensive sanitary pads are way beyond the reach of many girls and women. The five countries with the least affordable access to menstrual pads are in Africa with Ghana selling the most expensive products relative to monthly income. According to a BBC Poverty: Share of population living on less than \$6.85 n day, 2019

report in August 2023, a woman in Ghana earning a minimum wage of \$26/ month would have to spend \$3 to buy

two packs of sanitary towels (8 pads each). It often comes down to pads versus food with the latter winning on behalf of the family. In rural locations, often disposable products are not an option.



Menstruation is physically and mentally challenging for all females under the best of circumstances, so why should women have to beg, starve, sell themselves for sex, etc. just to manage a natural biological process?

Solutions:

- 1. Abolish all taxes on menstruation products.
- 2. Raise awareness of the period poverty issues and its impact on society.
- 3. Normalize discussions of menstruation care, encourage females to talk about issues, and seek help while increasing education, reducing stigmas, and taboos around the subject for everyone.



Viable Solution: The production, and use of a reusable sanitary pad kit can provide a safe, hygienic, comfortable, environmentally



friendly, and sustainable solution for menstruating females managing a normal biological process.

What: Each kit includes: (2) washable shields to hold the pad and prevent leaking; (8) absorbent and washable pads; (2) panties; (1) plastic quart bag for soiled pads; (1) gallon bag for washing the pads if necessary; soap; and, instructions for use and care. If cared for properly, the kit should last 3+ years.




How: The productions of these kits will be done via small female-businesses set up to serve the needs of the girls reaching puberty as well as providing a product for purchase by older females.

Where: The pilot program will be located in the village of Boate, located 2 hours north of Accra, at the primary school (founded in 2010 by Barbara and Jojo Entsuah, residents of Florida, a family physician and engineer by profession), to be managed by a teacher, Esther Yeboah, and initially involving 4 women, one being a seamstress.

Needed: To facilitate this start-up effort, funds are needed for the following items:

Equipment and Furniture: (3) non-electric, hand-cranked refurbished sewing machines, locally sourced and easy to maintain; (2) pressing irons; (5) worktables; (6) chairs



Kit Products: Cotton material for shields and bags, absorbent material for pads, waterproofing material, underwear, soap, plastic bags, ribbon



*A Rotary Club is being approached to provide a stipend for the women during the initial pilot program period.



Vision: Once this pilot project is implemented and deemed successful, this model will be repeated in various regions with the funding sourced from community members in the business, medical, and political fields, making it a "Ghanaians addressing a Ghanaian problem" in a sustainable manner while creating jobs.

Project Team Energy: This project is being managed by an amazing development and implementation team made up of men and women from the business, legal, educational, social, marketing, and medical professions. The vision of this team is to

help every girl reach puberty in a healthy manner, having the ability to confidently reach her potential and not be limited by menstruation but empowered by it. The team sees this is not a women-only issue but as a societal problem that deserves immediate attention and solutions.

HERO – Housing Emergency Relief Organization (Formerly Good Neighbor)

In early 2023, Grace and a group of local church leaders began to have conversations about the increasing number of financial requests we were receiving for rent and utilities. This increase, combined with the decrease of affordable housing, led this group to begin dreaming about a non-profit that could not only provide financial assistance to individuals, but also connect them with other resources and organizations for more long-term support. This effort is designed to supplement the SACRA (organization that meets this need within Staunton and Augusta County but does NOT include Waynesboro).

In November 2023, the Housing Emergency Relief Organization (HERO) of Waynesboro was launched (with the help of Community Foundation of Central Blue Ridge as our 501c sponsor). Churches, organizations, and individuals are able to donate at herowaynesboro.org, knowing that their donations will provide emergency relief to those at risk of eviction or utility cut-off. We currently have a 5-member board from:

- First Baptist Church
- Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church
- St John the Evangelist Catholic church
- St John's Episcopal Church
- Westminster Presbyterian Church

We have several volunteers to aid in the intake process and assess the ways we can support the individuals with their immediate needs. We currently Have funds from the founding churches & a \$15k matching grant from the community foundation.

Our mission is to support those in Waynesboro who are facing housing insecurity, regardless of race, religion, or identity. We believe that all people have the right to affordable housing. Our goal is to work to prevent individuals from becoming homeless because of eviction or utility cut-off through financial assistance from churches, organizations, and individuals. Our Website became live in early January 2024.

During 2024 we plan to help families in the Waynesboro area both via financial assistance and in partnering to ensure the community is able to network to appropriate resources via case management partnerships. Our current limit is \$300/family assistance with the ability to help twice a year. Our current model of support is via web forms, phone calls and a personal meeting if needed. All payments are paid directly to the landlord or utility provider.

Nicaraguan CICRIN Mission Trip

In the congregation's first mission trip to Nicaragua (February 10-17, 2023), six Grace members were joined by five other individuals to serve alongside hosts and partners at CICRIN, a pre-K through 12 school and refuge for abused, abandoned, and at-risk children and youth on Ometepe Island in Lake Nicaragua. In addition to enjoying fellowship with the kids and staff at CICRIN, the team worked hard on several projects: tiling stalls and painting interior and exterior walls of a decrepit boys' and girls' bath house; providing funds to install doors, wash basins, and stall fixtures; painting and doing repairs on several other buildings that had deferred maintenance needs due to fewer mission teams visiting during the pandemic; providing dental hygiene education to the 111 students in the CICRIN School.

The team also had the opportunity to worship, learn, and explore Ometepe as well as several other sites. Thank you to all GELC members who provided prayer and financial support. A return visit is planned for February 2024.

Refugee Resettlement Program Report of the Joint Grace-Westminster Presbyterian

"Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it." (Hebrews 13:1-2)

Winter. Phiston began to look at entering college, and toured BRCC and met with a counselor there. The team concentrated on continuing financial education in areas of bill paying, online banking, and buying groceries using WIC benefits. Working with the homeowners, several safety modifications to the home were made, including adding a peep hole to the front door, installing a railing on the front steps, and installing a better mailbox.

Spring. Chukizo and Isaac joined a local soccer team, and while Isaac is still learning strategies, Chukizo excelled on his team. Team members created a schedule for transporting the boys to games and practices. The family applied for and are awaiting their green cards — another important step in maintaining their status here in the U.S. Jules and Phiston were increased to full-time status at Virginia Panel, giving them full health and retirement benefits and a small raise. This entailed team members providing more education on insurance, retirement plans, and other benefits, The end of April signified the 1-year anniversary of the family entering the United States, and the team celebrated with them, presenting a digital photo album of many pictures over the first year so they could celebrate the changes, hard work, new relationships, and the fun. Masoka continues to work on learning English through the Building Bridges women's zoom class. She hopes to be able to seek employment once Happy can be included in day care and the adults' schedules can be adjusted to accommodate three of them working.

Summer. Phiston attended his first college course – an introductory course on attending college. He then enrolled in fall classes at BRCC. The team again developed a transportation plan for getting him to and from classes once they started. The children took a break from classes for the summer, as did Masoka break from English for a while during the summer. All seemed to thrive as they enjoyed the summer activities.

Fall. After much study and practice, both Jules and Phiston obtained their driver's licenses last fall! They were very excited about this big step. Jules received a donation from a generous person of the used Toyota Highlander that the team had been using to transport the family. Phiston had saved much of his earnings and purchased a used Honda Accord. These events have increased the

family's independence so very much! For the spring semester Phiston will be able to drive himself to and from school, and Jules is able to drive the family shopping, visiting friends and family in Harrisonburg, and all sorts of other outings. This Christmas the family was more familiar with American traditions, and while they still do not do gifts in the ways that most Americans do, the parents did enjoy going shopping to find new clothes and a few gifts for the children. The Welcome Team contributed gifts of basic car tools (scrapers, tire pumps, etc.) for both cars as a Christmas gift.

After completing two ESL for college level students and a basic computer course, Phiston met with a college counselor who talked with him about the educational tracks at BRCC. He decided he wants to pursue a 4-year degree, so he will be taking classes that will transfer to a four-year school. He will be taking another 3 courses in the spring semester. The younger children are doing well in school and are receiving tutoring from team members once a week to help them build skills they may have missed previously or that are giving them difficulty.

The whole family has encountered so many changes and challenges over the 20 months they've been here, and they've faced them with determination and joy and so much flexibility!

Please continue to keep them all in prayer as they begin another year in this country and continue to grow and learn.

Renewing Homes Augusta Projects

Grace worked on over 10 projects with Renewing Homes of Greater Augusta this year for home repair projects for families of home owners in need. Our projects this year included building or repairing wheelchair ramps, building a deck and roof repairs to a home plus other repairs.

Safety Help Team

Safety Help Team is a new group in 2024 to help Grace members review the safety of their homes. The goal is to confirm safe homes for all. We are looking for both Grace members interested in a review and those wishing to help.

WARM Ministry

Grace continues to support the Waynesboro Area Refuge Ministry (WARM) which provides shelter for the area's homeless adults through the Cold Weather Shelter (CWS) and Ruth WARM House for women and children. Grace continues to sponsor a room at the WARM Ruth House.

eating each evening during our week. We also provided both breakfast and lunches several weeks plus snacks and additional supplies while WARM was holding their motel shelter during the first half of 2022.

Support Round Table Reports

Building and Maintenance Fund



GELC was gifted \$250,000 from the estate of Morris and Ty Elliott in August of 2023. The contribution was designated for building and maintenance use. The Building and Maintenance Fund Committee was established by Church Council to develop a policy and procedure for the fund and to provide ongoing oversight. The Policy and Procedure were presented to Council and approved in November. The Committee proposed and Council approved the transfer of \$100,000 to the existing Capital Project Fund to fund the \$75,000 of improvements that were approved by the Congregation (roof replacement, security system upgrade, exterior painting, and bracing the entrance awning) and to provide funds for anticipated repairs/improvements for the future. The remaining \$150,000 was invested and is monitored by the Committee and Council.

Church Property Report

Here is a list of Property Committee tasks and church property issues during 2023.

- January- Had Ronnie Ritchie Services roto root the main sewer line behind the church during the Warm Shelter in early January.
- March Church property work day. Two loads of mulch were spread and shrubs trimmed. Water fountain in Fellowship Hall was repaired by Ron Myers.
- April Changed all side aisle light bulbs with new LED bulbs.
 - Roto rooted main drain line front lawn of church from window wells to drain line all of the way to 13th street drain exit.
- June Thru August Contracted with Austin & Sons to scrape, prime, and paint entire front, 2nd story of sanctuary, office/columbarium and 13th Street entrance areas of church exterior.
- August Contracted with Baber Enterprises to install new GAF Premium Shingles to entire sanctuary roof (front and backside). Shingles have a 40-year warranty. The new roof eliminated all roof leakage problems.
 - Sanctuary Entrance awning stabilized by welding in supports (Staunton Machine Works) and adding bracing spacers on church/awning locations. Ron Myers coordinated this work.
- October Full property grounds workday.
- November Contracted Ronnie Ritchie Services to install an additional commercial gas hot water heater in series with our existing gas hot water heater and to install a cold water mixing value to adjust hot water temperature to 120 to deliver more hot water for the Warm Shelter/Hiker Hostel showers.
- December- Dominion Power dropped a phase (we have 3 phase power at Grace) during the Warm Shelter week. Problems showed up with loss of heat for VMA/ Sunday School rooms along with elevator problems. Contacted Eddie Etter who helped us find the problem which was a dropped neutral connection on the main Dominion Power transformer on 13th Street. Dominion Power was contacted and repairs conducted that evening.

Columbarium and Memorial Garden Report

A Columbarium is a way to bring Christian Burial back to the Church!

The completed east wall of the Columbarium contains space for 144 niches with stone facings. The uncompleted west wall has space for 164 niches, the niches will be added in the future. Each niche has space for two brass urns, which the church stocks and furnishes without cost to you. The price for a niche is \$2,250 including two (2) brass urns, no charge for opening and closing the niche, and for engraving of the face stone with names and dates. There are 40 niches sold. There are a total of 25 sets of ashes entered into the Columbarium.

The memorial brick patio area has 43 bricks with names, most of these are for members and family members, who are buried elsewhere. An engraved brick has space for two names and cost \$300.

The Columbarium committee consist of three members. Ron Almarode's term ends 12/31/28, Bradley Keefer's term ends 12/31/24, and Jerry Kite's term ends 12/31/26. The Pastor is a permanent member of the committee.

If you have any questions concerning the Columbarium and brick patio area, contact any of the above members. Bradley Keefer has been doing the record keeping, the opening and closing of the niches, getting the stone faces engraved with names and dates.

Finance Committee

GELC is in sound financial health entering 2024. The Finance Committee works closely with the Stewardship Committee and Church Council to develop a spending plan for the congregation's approval.

Our programs at Valley Music Academy are thriving now that life has returned to an always-interesting normal. We are back to about 90% of the enrollment we had in 2019. We hope to increase that to 100% or more this year with improved marketing and community outreach.

We currently have 135 active students taking lessons in ten different instruments. We are offering group classes in piano and guitar, as well as our growing Saturday Musikgarten classes. Give us the ability to adapt to the cultural, economic and social changes that occur in the neighborhoods we serve.


