

A reading from the Acts:

Acts 17:16-31

¹⁶While Paul was waiting for them in Athens, he was deeply distressed to see that the city was full of idols. ¹⁷So he argued in the synagogue with the Jews and the devout persons, and also in the marketplace every day with those who happened to be there. ¹⁸Also some Epicurean and Stoic philosophers debated with him. Some said, "What does this babbler want to say?" Others said, "He seems to be a proclaimer of foreign divinities." (This was because he was telling the good news about Jesus and the resurrection.) ¹⁹So they took him and brought him to the Areopagus and asked him, "May we know what this new teaching is that you are presenting? ²⁰It sounds rather strange to us, so we would like to know what it means." ²¹Now all the Athenians and the foreigners living there would spend their time in nothing but telling or hearing something new.

²²Then Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, "Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. ²³For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, 'To an unknown god.' What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. ²⁴The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, ²⁵nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything,

since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. ²⁶From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, ²⁷so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him — though indeed he is not far from each one of us. ²⁸For 'In him we live and move and have our being'; as even some of your own poets have said,

'For we too are his offspring.'


²⁹Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. ³⁰While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, ³¹because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead."





To you, O God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory in your holy church, now and forever.

Gathered into one by the Holy Spirit, let us pray as Jesus taught us.



The Holy Communion

The congregation may be seated.

OUR LORD BIDS YOU WELCOME TO THIS HOLY MEAL! At the table of our Lord Jesus Christ, God nourishes faith, forgives sin, and calls us to be witnesses to the Gospel. Here we receive Christ's body and blood and God's gifts of forgiveness of sin, life, and salvation to be received by faith for the strengthening of faith. In this sacrament the crucified and risen Christ is present, giving his true body and blood as food and drink. This real presence is a mystery. Admission to the Sacrament is by invitation of the Lord — regardless of Church denomination — to those who are baptized. (Taken from the ELCA statement on worship. The Use and Means of Grace ©1997)

Ushers will invite you to come down the center aisle. Receive the bread from the pastor or assisting minister, then turn to the side you have sat on, and receive the wine/grape juice from the communion assistant at the altar rail. Place your empty cup in the trays at the end of the railing, and return to your pew via the side aisle. Those giving the bread and wine will say the following:

The body of Christ, given for you The blood of Christ, shed for you.

You may respond with "Amen"

After all have returned to their places, the congregation stands.

The Communion Blessing

The body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ strengthen you and keep you in his grace. **Amen**

Welcome to Worship! A letter was sent by email and U.S. Mail announcing a change to our masking policy at Grace:

- We will follow CDC "color" guidelines to determine masking at worship. If our area is in an Orange (high risk) condition, we will mask for worship.
- If we are in a Yellow (medium risk) or Green (low risk) condition: those who are not vaccinated or are immune-compromised are encouraged to mask, while those who are vaccinated and boosted are "mask optional, but welcome."
- This applies to Worship, Meetings, Classes, VMA, other users of the facility, etc.
- As of Wednesday, all of our "Sample Area" (Augusta, Nelson, Staunton, Waynesboro) are in "Green", or in the low risk condition.

Refugee Resettlement News. The M family has moved into their new home on King avenue, and things are moving quickly for them and for us. We are still working on getting the house set up to meet their needs and preferences, two of the adults have appointments for job interviews, and they are beginning to explore the community with the guidance of the Westminster/Grace Resettlement Team! We hope to have permission soon to let you know their names and share some pictures of the family of eight. They are originally from the Democratic Republic of Congo, but have lived most of their lives (all their lives in the case of the children) in a refugee camp in Tanzania. At this point we don't need specific items, but we will send out a call when something is needed. If you would like to contribute right now, we are accepting financial donations to help with expenses – just note on your donation that it is for refugee resettlement. Last Sunday for another opportunity to help Refugee children - Close to home, there remains a refugee crisis not often remembered; those of thousands of refugees from the nation of Haiti. A combination of multiple natural disasters and political instability, much of Haiti remains in crisis. Project Esperanza, a Winchester organization committed to teaching Haitian children in the midst of crisis, has for a number of years hosted a school for Haitian children in a refugee area in the Dominican Republic (https://projectesperanza.giv.sh/). Our CCE&J (Christian Coalition for Justice and Equity), in partnership with Christ Tabernacle, has pledged \$2705, enough to sponsor 4-1/2 students for the year (\$600/student; this compares to Virginia's \$5488/student/year number). Grace and Christ Tabernacle congregations are invited to contribute \$295 to allow us to sponsor 5 students fully (or more to sponsor a sixth)! 
